



Royal Artillery

The Royal Artillery (RA) is the common name for the Royal Regiment of Artillery, an arm of the British Army. Despite its name, it comprises a number of regiments.

These regiments used dingo's for both liaison purposes and for mobile observation post.

Being armoured highly maneuverable and fitted with high power radios they were well suited for this purpose.

'Charlie' served with C Troop/95 Bty/48 Field Regt RA, having completed four months in Korea he was then transferred to Malaya April 1956 to Dec 1958.

The Dingo was only used for escort duty Dingo in the Cameron Highlands, escorting our vehicles to and from our base camp on Boh Tea Estate, and also down to the plains.

On occasion we did go onto firing position because we were carrying two wirelesses a 19 set and a 22 set, and liaised with the infantry when they required artillery support.

Normally we had to observe the fire of the guns for about an hour, then the infantry moved in to see if any CT were in that area.
